Val Gardena/Gröden is looking forward to the return of the ski stars - and to enthusiastic fans

The 54th Saslong Classic is just around the corner! On the last weekend before Christmas, ski fans on-site and around the globe will know whether the Norwegian Aleksander Aamodt Kilde will once again put his stamp on the World Cup classics at the foot of the Sassolungo/Langkofel mountain. Or whether it will be the first victory of an "Azzurro" since Werner Heel's triumph in the Super-G in December 2008. As usual, the super-G opens the exciting weekend in Val Gardena/Gröden on Friday, December 17, ahead of the absolute highlight following on Saturday, December 18 with the downhill. Both races start at 11:45 a.m.



If one had to sum up the special features of the 54th Saslong Classic with a single catchphrase, or give it a title, then what comes to mind is "comeback". On the one hand, the return of Aleksander Aamodt Kilde, dominator of the Val Gardena/Gröden Classic in December 2020. The 29-year-old first triumphed in the super-G twelve months ago and 24 hours later also

won the downhill after a wild ride over the icy Saslong. The Norwegian thus wrote a piece of skiing history in the South Tyrolean World Cup mecca. A double victory in Val Gardena/Gröden in both speed disciplines is an absolute rarity and, before Kilde, only his compatriot Aksel Lund Svindal had managed it in the 2015/16 season.

A few weeks after his heroics on the Saslong, Kilde suffered a serious injury rupturing his cruciate ligament during training in Hinterreith in mid-January 2021 and was out for the rest of the World Cup season. Now it's his comeback in the Olympic winter - and after his double victory in Beaver Creek, the Norwegian will arrive in South Tyrol with confidence.



But the 54th Saslong Classic is also the comeback of the fans. After ghost races in 2020 due to the Corona pandemic, there is immense anticipation of the return of the skiing enthusiasts. The importance of a live audience for the good mood and a unique atmosphere in the Ski World Cup became clear in recent weeks when they were

once again allowed to participate in the Ski World Cup. "Last year we sorely missed the spectators in Val Gardena/Gröden. We are now all the more delighted that fans are allowed to return to the Saslong. They make the entire event something very special, they are the salt in the soup," says Rainer Senoner, President of the organizing Saslong Classic Club.

Strict security concept

That being said, there will be no "full house" and wild parties in the midst of the Corona pandemic. Safety still comes first. The finish stadium may be at 75 percent capacity. The safety concept worked out by the organizers with the South Tyrolean Sanitary Service stipulates that all spectators must be vaccinated or recovered. In addition, masks are compulsory in the entire spectator area. No hospitality will be offered.

As far as the race program is concerned, the Saslong Classic Club, in coordination with the international ski federation FIS and rights holder Infront, is relying on the tried and tested. The 54th Saslong Classic will kick off on Wednesday, December 15 with the first official training session. The following day, Dominik Paris, Vincent Kriechmayr, Beat Feuz & Co. will hurl themselves over the Sochers walls, the Camel Humps and the Ciaslat as part of the second training run. On Friday,



December 17, the first race in Val Gardena/Gröden will take place with the super-G, before the renowned South Tyrolean winter sports event will be duly concluded on Saturday, December 18 with the classic downhill. The two training sessions and also the two races will all start at 11:45 a.m.

The Norwegians were in a class of their own in Val Gardena/Gröden over the past decade

The answer to the question of the top favorite in the 54th Saslong Classic is quickly found. The man to beat in all probability will be Aleksander Aamodt Kilde. The 29-year-old Norwegian made skiing history last December in Val Gardena/Gröden.

Kilde was only the second racer to win the downhill and super-G on the Saslong on the same weekend. A feat that, apart from himself, only his Norwegian compatriot Aksel Lund Svindal had achieved. That was in December 2016. In addition to Kilde and Svindal, there are three other legends who have stood on the highest podium in both speed disciplines in Val Gardena/Gröden: Pirmin Zurbriggen (Switzerland), Lasse Kjus (Norway) and Michael Walchhofer (Austria) - but not in the same year.

That the Saslong has been a Norwegian course in recent times is no secret. Every year since 2012, an athlete from the northern European country has been unbeatable in at least one of the two speed events. The only exception was December 2019, when Austria's Vincent Kriechmayr won what was probably the longest super-G in skiing history after freak weather, and the downhill had to be canceled the following day because the weather was far too warm.

Austria is ahead in the statistics books

The bare figures of the most recent races in Val Gardena/Gröden tell a clear story: of the last 17 events, eleven ended with a victory for Kjetil, Jansrud & Co. In the super-G, the Scandinavians triumphed in seven of the last nine races. The Norwegians made a particularly strong impression in 2016 when they took all three podium places in the super-G - a result that had previously only been achieved by the skiing nation of Austria in 2004.

It is also the ÖSV racers who lead the way in nations rankings on the Saslong. Since the first World Cup races in 1969, 18 downhill victories have gone to their account, with the legendary Franz Klammer triumphing no less than four times on the Val Gardena/Gröden downhill course and,



together with the "Azzurro" Kristian Ghedina, being record winners in the "supreme discipline". Switzerland has 14 triumphs, and its most successful athlete on the Saslong is Peter Müller with three victories. Three downhill victories also go to the account of the US American Steven Nyman, who at the "tender" age of 39 will be once again at the start this season hoping for some more medals.

The last victory of an "Azzurro" was 13 years ago. In 2008 Werner Heel won the super-G at his home races. Perhaps this will be the big moment for the racers of the Italian national team around Dominik Paris, Christof Innerhofer & Co. The local ski fans would certainly be thrilled.

It has been a long time since the Italian national anthem was played at the Saslong Classic in honor of the winner. 13 years ago, on December 19, 2008, Werner Heel won the super-G in Val Gardena/Gröden ahead of Didier Defago (Switzerland) and Patrik Jaerbyn (Sweden). A day that is still very present in the 39-year-old from the Passeier valley and still arouses emotions.

"The best thing is that over time you realize more and more how nice it actually is to win in Val Gardena/Gröden. Every year, when the races are around the corner again, you are reminded of that. And I was the last racer from the Italian team to win it. And that's cool, really phenomenal," Werner Heel is justifiably proud of one of his total of three World Cup victories.

Werner Heel retired from skiing two years ago. But the ex-professional from the Passeier Valley (Walten) can't do without skiing altogether. "After my career ended, I first took a break for a year, then I have already found a new passion. I am now a talent scout for the ski brand Atomic - a job that I like very much. It was obvious that I would do something in this field after my active career. I've had so much experience in this field, you just have to stick with it," says Heel.

In private life, little Ben keeps Werner Heel on his toes

In his private life, too, Werner Heel has had his hands full for almost six months. He and his partner, former ski racer Manuela Mölgg, became parents to little Ben on May 6. "This has changed our lives a lot, of course, but in a positive way. We just enjoy the time, it's always nice to come home," enthuses the 39-year-old.

With such dispositions, the son can only become a skier - right? "Let's see," laughs Heel. "We would of course welcome it if he decided to become an athlete. What he wants to do then is his decision. If he becomes a skier, then we will of course try to help him as much as possible with our experiences."



It is certain that Werner Heel will be on site at the World Cup in Val Gardena/Gröden again this year. "Yes, of course! I've already signed up," the Olympic bronze medalist in the 2010 Vancouver super-G admits. Heel sees the Americans and the Norwegians in the role of favorites this year. "They have always been fast here. I'm especially excited about Aleksander Aamodt Kilde. He's been injured, but he's a great skier." He also has high hopes for the home athletes. "Maybe this year the moment has come and another Azzurro will replace me. We will see...", Heel is looking forward to the excitement.



Who will win this year's

DOLOMITES Val Gardena South Tyrol Ski Trophy?

The World Cup organizers in Val Gardena/Gröden, together with the tourism managers of DOLOMITES Val Gardena Marketing, have set a special prize with the goal of enhancing the classics on the Saslong. In this competition, the racer who scores the most World Cup points in the races at the foot of the Sassolungo/Langkofel mountain on the last weekend before Christmas can once again look forward to the DOLOMITES Val Gardena South Tyrol Ski Trophy and thus to an original 3D wooden bust, as well as extra prize money of 5,000 euros and a short vacation in Val Gardena/Gröden.

The World Cup races in Alpine skiing have a decades-long tradition in Val Gardena/Gröden. Since 1969, the renowned winter sports event has been organized by the Saslong Classic Club with great success, and in 1970 it also shone as an excellent World Cup host. In a constant effort to make the races on the legendary South Tyrolean downhill slope even more professional and attractive, the dedicated organizing committee, together with DOLOMITES Val Gardena Marketing, is once again awarding a special prize. The DOLOMITES Val Gardena South Tyrol Ski Trophy will be awarded to the racer who scores the most World Cup points in the super-G on Friday, December 17, 2021 and in the classic downhill on December 18, 2021. If two racers are tied, the athlete with the better ranking in one of the two races will prevail. If there is also a tie here, the winner will be the one with the better result in the downhill race.

"With this initiative, we want to create an incentive for the best downhill skiers in the world and reward them for top sporting performances in both disciplines. We were able to win an extremely sport-affine partner with DOLOMITES Val Gardena Marketing for this project last year. After the successful premiere it was clear for both sides that we would like to continue this initiative. For this and for the many years of excellent cooperation in the context of our speed races, DOLOMITES Val Gardena Marketing deserves our sincere thanks", emphasizes Rainer Senoner, President of the Saslong Classic Club.

DOLOMITES Val Gardena Marketing also remains enthusiastic about the special prize. "Projects of this kind appeal to us. The commitment of the Saslong Classic Club rubs off positively on the

By the way, the true-to-the-original 3D wooden busts of the successful racers will be on public display. They can be viewed by all skiing enthusiasts in the "Hall Of Fame" at the Saslonch Hut. In addition to the bust of Kildes, those of Kjetil Jansrud and Rasmus Windingstad are also exhibited there. The DOLOMITES Val Gardena South Tyrol Ski Trophy has evolved from

the South Tyrol Ski Trophy, which was awarded from 2016 to 2019.

Val Gardena ski history can also be lived on the Ski Champions Walk in Selva/Wolkenstein. It is dedicated to the ski champions who have won a World Cup race in the valley since 1969 or became World Champions in 1970, as well as to all those who believed in the idea of skiing in Val Gardena/Gröden with a lot of ambition and pioneering spirit. The start of the course is at the walkway of the old railroad line behind the ski school in the village center of Selva/Wolkenstein.

Val Gardena/Gröden is Italy's candidate for the 2029 Alpine World Ski Championships

Val Gardena/Gröden has come a first step closer to its big dream of hosting the 2029 Alpine Ski World Championships. At the beginning of September, the Italian winter sports federation FISI declared itself in favor of a candidacy of the South Tyrolean World Cup organizer at international level. In a duel with Sestriere, Val Gardena/Gröden, which had already hosted a World Ski Championships in 1970, prevailed in a secret ballot with 8:2 votes of the total of ten delegates. Currently, the course is being set for the preparation of the official candidacy, which must be submitted to the international ski federation FIS in the spring of 2023.

in action in February 2020 at the Biathlon World Championships in the Antholz Arena in South Tyrol - now this Austrian will transform the finish stadium of the Saslong into a magic place together with Morandini.

Ivo Demetz, long-time OC member, passed away on Sunday, April 11 at the age of 93. He participated in the World Cup races in Val Gardena/Gröden for many decades with great commitment and even greater enthusiasm. The Saslong Classic Club will always keep an honorable memory of Ivo Demetz.

Key Sections of the Saslong

Ciampinoi (2249 m)

Local mountain of Selva-Wolkenstein is reachable by the Ciampinoi cable car from Selva-Wolkenstein and Saslong cable car and Sochers chair lift from Ruacia

Spinel (2091 m)

Drop-off right after start of the course. This section has the highest gradient of the entire course (56.9%).

Saut dl Moro (2018 m)

Site of the Moro jump, the first big jump on Saslong. It is named after the Moro meadow

Sochers Walls (1900 m)

Steep section with 55.9% gradient named after the Sochers meadows

Camel humps (1813 m)

Originally known as the "Costa de Gialina" (Gialina Ridge), the humps were renamed Camel Humps by FIS Technical Delegate Sepp Sulzberger. This is the most storied section of Saslong, producing jumps of up to 80m in length and with heights of 4-6m. The hump were first skipped by Uli Spiess (AUT) in 1980 in a legendary long jump

Ciaslat (1720 m)

Named after the Ciaslat meadow, featuring a twisting section with up to 17 smaller and larger corrugated bumps.

Nucia Turn and Finish Schuss (1550 m)

This section is named after the Nucia farm with an up to 51.6% steep turn veering heavily toward the left

Tunnel-Jump

Final jump named after the Saslong Tunnel which runs below the jump. The tunnel is 375m long and part of the newly-built by-pass (2009) to St. Christina.

Ruacia (1410 m)

The finish area is named after a local farm
